### Short-Term Teams for Long-Term Development

## HISTORY

Some 13,500 feet in the Andes, 300 miles and a day's journey by jeep from La Paz, lies the village of Quesimpuco. More than 10,000 people live beyond Quesimpuco in the Chaupirana Valley, accessible only by narrow foot trails carved into steep mountainsides. Quesimpuco is in the province of Chayanta in North Potosi, one of the poorest and most remote areas in the Americas.

SIFAT has worked in this area since 1995. Our short-term mission teams have built a church, a high school, a clinic and a boarding home for students from remote villages where there are no schools. We have been able to reach many communities with education, appropriate technology, health training and scholarships. Our high school graduates have gone on to study at universities and have become nurses. agronomists, teachers, medical doctors and more. These young people are now returning to Quesimpuco and Chayanta to make a real difference in their communities.

Our focus areas for the next five years are Training, Health, Discipleship and Socioeconomic Development. With a local grassroots farmers' association and members of the community, our teams will work on an irrigation system, guinea pig farms and hydroponic systems. SIFAT medical teams will work with the Local Health Watch Program, supervised by Dr. Ruth Mamani, valedictorian of our first graduating class. Much is left to be done across tribal boundaries, generational divides and cultural walls. SIFAT teams will continue to work alongside the people of the Chayanta River Valley in their quest to live a more abundant life.
